It's proof we are doing something right, even if it does sometimes require us to limit programming to Bartlett residents to make sure we are prioritizing our community's families.



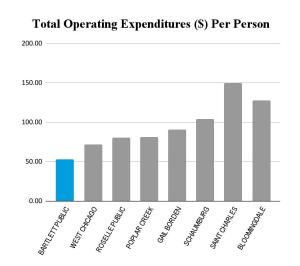


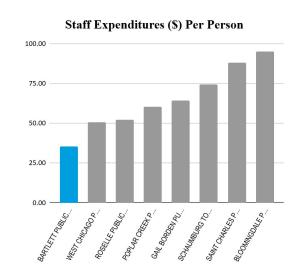
We've accomplished this while remaining one of the most fiscally responsible library districts in the region.

We've eliminated the budget deficit and have maintained a balanced budget for the past six years.

We spend the public's tax dollars conservatively, ensuring every dollar we spend goes towards things our patrons are requesting and keeping our building safe and maintained.







We seek out donations and utilize resources and equipment from other libraries.

As a result, compared to our neighboring library districts, we spend the least per person we serve with the lowest staff expenses.





However, our facilities are aging and we don't currently have the funding to address the major improvements desired by the community.

Built in 1983 with two later additions, the outdated building and antiquated furniture keeps our library from being the inviting community space it could be.



Lack of space is a significant concern, limiting our program offerings and registration while our quiet spaces and study rooms are consistently overbooked, youth spaces are inadequate, and we don't have room to expand our collection of books and AV materials.

The community is requesting updated technology and access to more STEM and Career & Technical Education (CTE) programming.







Our private rooms aren't as private as they could be.

The building requires accessibility improvements and a more efficient layout.

Our heating and air conditioning mechanical systems are deteriorating, and with eight different units trying to maintain our library, we are frustratingly inefficient.



Not only do these challenges hold our library back, but they also make it harder to retain our quality staff.

It is putting at risk what makes our library special.





That's why our community has come together to collaborate on a long-term solution that responsibly addresses our infrastructure and space challenges, increases our efficiency and sustainability, and raises property values for everyone in the community.

Programming Spaces

Advantages:

Disadvantages:

• Cannot achieve without major renovation or new construction.

Estimated Cost: \$1.5 million





Study Rooms & Quiet Spaces

Advantages:

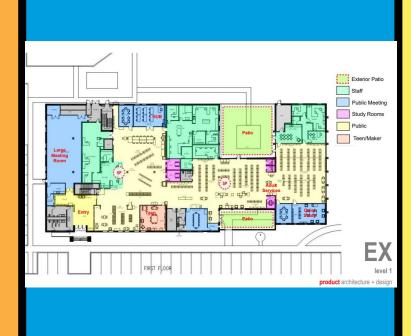
 Additional rooms and spaces to allow library patrons to read, learn, work, and relax in a quiet, peaceful atmosphere.

Disadvantages:

• Cannot achieve without major renovation.

Estimated Cost: \$600,000





Building Layout & Accessibility

Advantages:

 More efficient library layout including relocating service desk and staff closer to the front entrance as well as improved building accessibility including investments in entrances, restrooms, and the elevator.

Disadvantages:

• Costly due to maintenance needs in older building.

Estimated Cost: \$2.5 million





Technology

Advantages:

 Dedicated STEM and Career & Technical Education spaces with improved access to technology, including a makerspace, to allow for hands on learning and the opportunity to explore new ideas and potential careers.

Disadvantages:

 Cannot achieve without expansion or new construction as well as additional staff.

Estimated Cost: \$750,000





Drive-Up Window

Advantages:

 New drive-up window allowing patrons to drop off and renew items conveniently from the comfort of their vehicle, which is helpful to seniors and parents with young children.

Disadvantages:

 Cannot achieve without expansion and reconfiguration of existing site.

Estimated Cost: \$800,000.





Youth Spaces

Advantages:

 Improved spaces specifically designed for children, including larger story time and crafting rooms and a larger play space with innovative toys to encourage kids to explore, play, and be creative in a safe environment.

Disadvantages:

 Cannot achieve without expansion or new construction.

Estimated Cost: \$4.5 million





Books & Shelving

Advantages:

 Additional and improved shelving to allow the district to expand its collection of books and audiovisual materials that is currently maximized due to space constraints and lack of shelving.

Disadvantages:

• Potential loss of meeting space.

Estimated Cost: \$200,000





Meeting Spaces

Advantages:

 Additional and larger meeting spaces to meet the demand from community organizations looking for meeting space in our community.

Disadvantages:

 Cannot achieve without major renovation or new construction.

Estimated Cost: \$900,000





Outdoor Spaces

Advantages:

 Dedicated spaces on library grounds with permanent seating to allow for outdoor programming for all ages with potential for enclosing the courtyard to make it an indoor/outdoor educational and programming space.

Disadvantages:

• Potential loss of green space.

Estimated Cost: \$300,000 to \$1.2 million





Adult & Teen Spaces

Advantages:

• Additional quiet and collaborative spaces for adults and teens to meet the high demand for space.

Disadvantages:

• Cannot achieve without expansion or new construction.

Estimated Cost: \$4.65 million





Sustainability

Advantages:

 Investments in renewable energy such as solar roof panels, electric vehicle charging stations, and geothermal heating and cooling systems to sustainably power the library and gain LEED certification.

Disadvantages:

Costly due to outdated facilities.

Estimated Cost: \$650,000

Potential Infrastructure Solutions

- Renovation

Renovation

Advantages:

- Least expensive option.
- Essential infrastructure work can be completed.

Disadvantages:

- Maintenance and infrastructure costs will increase exponentially as building continues to age.
- Nearly all improvements desired by the community cannot be achieved.

Estimated Cost: \$9.2 million

Approximate Average Tax Impact: \$68/yr*

*Based on average \$400,000 home in the district.



Additions + Renovation

Advantages:

- Essential infrastructure work can be completed.
- Many improvements desired by the community can be achieved through additions and significant renovations.

Disadvantages:

- Maintenance and infrastructure costs will increase exponentially as building continues to age.
- Some improvements desired by the community cannot be achieved.

Estimated Cost: \$16.3 million

Approximate Average Tax Impact: \$120/yr* *Based on average \$400,000 home in the district.





New Library

Advantages:

- Brand new library building for the community.
- Long-term operational and maintenance savings.
- All major improvements desired by the community can be achieved.

Disadvantages:

Most expensive option.

Estimated Cost: \$32.5 million

Approximate Average Tax Impact: \$239/yr*

*Based on average \$400,000 home in the district.
